The investigation into George White's activities on behalf of the CIA continues. I have recently read the transcript of your interview with [REDACTED]. Since that interview, the Director of Central Intelligence has made a commitment to the Congress to make every effort to identify persons possibly given drugs by George White without their informed consent. Since that commitment was made, George's diaries have been reviewed in detail for evidence of the identity of persons who may have been surreptitiously given LSD by George. His diary indicates that you were present on [REDACTED] when an individual, perhaps [REDACTED] apparently was given LSD. I would very much like to hear from you to discuss your recollections of that event. Xerox copies of pertinent pages of the diary are enclosed as a possible memory aid. Although we would like to know what happened at that dinner, our principal desire is to identify and locate [REDACTED].

Knowing of that event, can you recall any other event which might have been an LSD test? Did you ever experience any strange or unusual reactions after visiting with the Whites?

[REDACTED] assured me over the phone she would forward this letter to you. I hope you receive it promptly. I would very much appreciate your contacting me at your earliest convenience, either by mail to me at the above address or if you prefer you may phone me at [REDACTED]. A collect call will of course be accepted. I look forward to hearing from you.
