In 1977 the Director of Central Intelligence, Admiral Stansfield Turner, made a commitment to Congress to make every practical effort to identify and notify persons who may have been unwittingly involved in CIA's drug research program. In 1953 Mr. George White, a Federal Bureau of Narcotics officer, also served the CIA as a "consultant." Events in recent years have disclosed that he administered to unwitting individuals certain drugs to which he had access, apparently as a means of testing for reaction in non-clinical surroundings. This letter is to confirm our telephone conversation of 24 July 1979 and to inform you that George White's diary, only recently made available to us, indicates that you may have been an unwitting test subject. Copies of the pages from Mr. White's diary, entries for [REDACTED], which mention your name are enclosed.

I thank you very much for your helpful cooperation in furnishing information which might help me to locate other persons who may have been similarly involved. Should you discover that you have additional information not available when we talked, I may be reached by letter at the above address or you may phone me at [REDACTED]. A collect call will be accepted.

Good luck to your son should he follow through on his plans to apply for employment with the CIA. I know nothing about job availabilities or the skills and specialties being hired. For that information I suggest that you write to the Office of Personnel at the above address.
